After some prayer and preparations with Sofia and Saul from San Luis, Arizona, a breakfast program on Saturdays was opened for the children in the neighborhood around San Mateo.

From the beginning, this breakfast program for children up to 18-years old was well attended. Sofia and her husband, Saul, along with their children, are so excited to serve these kids a healthy, nutritious meal at least once a week.

Every Saturday before they start eating their meal, Saul prays with them; sometimes

pastor Job plays the guitar and teaches them a new song. Every time I go back to visit, I can see that the same children are in church on Sundays and how it is helping them to see a different perspective in their lives; that there is a God who loves them, but also people who love them in the church as well.

Another site where we are serving breakfast is at Lirio del Valle (Lily of the Valley) Lutheran Church in Tijuana. They started serving breakfast to children on February 15th. I was there for that day and I talked to a lady, Antonia and she told me 'Muchas Gracias' (thank you very much) for feeding the children a good meal once a week. Then she added, 'Yesterday my children had only one meal, in the afternoon'.

I thought what a wonderful opportunity to tell these children and their mothers that this was thanks to the generosity and love from many people in the United States, that people are moved to help because the love they receive everyday from our loving Father in Heaven.

Angel Scholarship Program Changing Lives



What a pleasure to see a young girl finishing High School in Mexico. Keren, pictured above, was about to leave school because of a lack of money and supplies for school. Her dad, Pastor Josafat from Rey de Gloria Lutheran Church, works as a taxi driver

during the night and in the ministry during the day, only making around \$120 pesos a day (\$10). When I heard that Keren was about to leave school, I offered her parents help with a scholarship from our Angel Scholarship Program. LBCM provided financial support as well as school supplies for Keren. She has been able to continue in High School in a training program to become a nurse's aid in Mexico. I have personally seen how she struggled to go to school and how she helps her parents in the church. After graduation, Keren will be able to get a job as a nurse's aid that pays a little bit more than others and she will have a chance to be the first in her family that will go to college.

Since LBCM started to give Keren support for her schooling, I have witnessed how her attitude toward her life has changed. The last time I saw her, she expressed to me that Christ has changed her life forever and the support she has received has helped her change her life on this earth.
