

Crossing the Border for Mission Work

Over the course of a year, mission teams from churches and groups, as well as individuals, travel to Mexico to help our brothers and sisters south of the border with both physical and spiritual needs. The mission teams call LBCM to reserve a week or weekend to stay in one of the retreat centers. Then they start planning! They host fundraising events to raise the funds to build a house (or two or more), for various work projects and to pay for their trip. Much effort is put into the planning and fundraising, but in this time the Lord blesses them as they work together, encouraging their congregations to meet their mission opportunities. They are excited because they know they are serving the Lord Jesus Christ.

When the time comes for the mission trip, the mission team flies or drives to the border of Mexico and they cross over into Tijuana. While they are there, they have the opportunity to help people by building houses, distributing food, building or repairing churches or centers, etc. Some teams have the opportunity to help at the Youth Center, where activities are held for the youth in the communities. The mission team might help with improvements like painting, etc. Orphanages can be visited to play with the children or deliver donations.

The mission teams also have the opportunity to meet the spiritual needs of people in Mexico. The teams might distribute Spanish Bibles, have VBS with children in the community or at one of the local churches built by other mission teams through LBCM. Visiting pastors are usually invited to preach, celebrate communion or give a workshop to the Bible Institute students. Most mission teams join in worship at one of the local churches, and share a meal with the congregation. Activities are planned with the children. Some teams share music by singing or playing instruments. Everyone shares in the word of God.

Mission teams that travel across the border have the opportunity to see how safe Tijuana is, especially in the areas where we serve others. Teams have the opportunity to share their experiences with other team members when they have their devotionals, are sharing in the work of building a house or working on repairs to a property. They share meals. Each member of the team grows in their faith as they reflect on the physical and spiritual needs of the people in Mexico. When the mission teams return to their congregations or groups, they have the chance to share their experiences and to encourage others to join them for the next time. They know that the Lord has blessed them and they were a blessing to their brothers and sisters in Mexico and now they can be a blessing to others in the Unites States. Many team members return to the United States saying that the mission trip changed their lives while making a change in the lives of new friends in Mexico. Books and backpacks are ready for another school year in the city of Tijuana. Every year, through LBCM, many young people receive a scholarship which helps them complete their education. Thirty-eight children are being supported this year, most of them living in areas of vulnerability where poverty and neglect are visible.

Many of these children do not have enough resources to enable them to continue a proper student life. Parents provide books and uniforms when they can but often cannot cope with another financial burden. They choose to remove their children from school or send them without the uniforms and schools materials that are required. This often brings extra worry to the family; much as they want to be able to cover school expenses, they cannot. This brings stress and feelings of being inadequate to the children and many do not want to continue to go to school.
