Rainy Season

The rainy season brings pleasure to some people, the cooler weather, a sense that the Christmas season is here, but for others the rainy season comes with a lot of complications. For example, in Tijuana, when it rains, life becomes chaotic for the people living in the canyons on the outskirts of town.

The dusty dirt roads that are normal during the dry weather become muddy and slick and it is very difficult to drive, except with a 4-wheel drive vehicle. People don't go outside the house because it becomes unsafe to walk. There is a scarcity of food in the local, small stores because delivery trucks can't pass on the roads. Even the paved roads become dangerous and slick. School is canceled because of the danger of traveling to and from school. Many schools that are in session have leaking roofs, broken windows and no heater system. Students have to replace any supplies that get wet and are not usable, which is costly to the family.

Most houses in the outskirts of Tijuana are poorly constructed. During a rainstorm, the roofs leak. Some people cover their roofs with plastic or other materials which don't work well. If there are windows or doors, most aren't properly installed and let in wind and rain.

When a family receives the gift of a new house, they get so excited because they know that they will have a safe and warm place to live. LBCM continues to hand out food and blankets. Canned foods and instant ramen are easy to store and have on hand when it is hard to get out to buy food during a storm. The blankets and socks we hand out all year keep children as well as the elderly warm and less likely to

contract the sicknesses that come with the cold weather. Pictured below is Herlinda, she received a quilt and requested another for her husband, who also uses a wheelchair. She said that she will now have a warm winter!



We continue to try to meet the physical needs of the people living in the poorest neighborhoods in Mexico. Your donations help us to make it a brighter and warmer life for those in need, not only during the Christmas and Epiphany season, but during the entire year.

But the Lord answered our prayers when a neighbor lady came to us saying that she was selling her property just next door of the building we had been renting. The Lord blessed us with the ability to buy the property!

We are so happy to have a place where we can continue with youth activities to help children stay out of trouble and to hear about God's love.



However, the building that is on the property is not in good repair and is unsafe and not built to code. There is a need for a building that is more secure and suitable for a youth center. It is our desire to build a building that is more appropriate for Legna Lanza, LBCM's youth ministry coordinator, to hold activities for the children of El Maclovio community in Tijuana.

We would like to start the construction of the new building during summer of 2013 and even earlier, if possible. To make this possible we will need many mission groups to get involved in the process. We are hoping that the work can be accomplished in stages. One group can pour the cement slab, another can build the walls, another, the roof, one more for paneling, or sheet rock, and others for the insulation, dray wall, painting, etc. There are other things involved that can be done in one day or a week, like the plumbing, sewer connection, electrical wiring, build some cabinets, book cases, etc.

There is lots of work to be done, little by little we can do it!
