Building Houses, but the Need is Still Great



Pastor Richard Jaech brought his mission team from **Beautiful Savior Lutheran Church**, Vancouver, Washington, to share the

love of Christ by giving the gift of a new home to three different families. One of the families (pictured above) receiving a home was a family with seven children, along with Mom and Dad made a family of nine! They had been living in a structure they had built by themselves with whatever materials they could find or afford, mostly used materials. The house was in such bad shape that parts of it had to be torn down in order to build the new house. The building site was isolated on a very steep hill, with no roads leading to it, getting the new building materials to the site was a challenge. When their new house was dedicated, the family, along with the mission team and members from El Divino, were so excited that the family finally had a safe place to live. Now the family doesn't have to worry that their home may collapse with them in it.

A mission team from **St Marks Lutheran Church** from Tacoma, Washington, lead by Pastor Jan Rudd, came on June 18-24. They were able to build four houses!

This year has brought many blessings from God. Among these blessings is the opportunity to continue to support adolescents and their families by providing scholarships for the adolescents to further their education.

The Angel Scholarship Program is designed for adolescents going into junior high and high school. Many families in Tijuana are unable to fulfill all the economic requirements for the year of tuition fees and uniforms for school. This is why it is important for the Angel Scholarship Program to be able to encourage families in need so they can help their children in furthering their education for a better life.

This year the program will be helping in three different areas in the city of Tijuana. We have the most number of students being helped in the Maclovio Rojas area. It is a rural community, located on the north-east side of Tijuana. It is a neighborhood where teens and children are constantly influenced by drugs.

It is urgent that children and teens at risk in these areas know the great love God has for each one of them and the new hopes and opportunities that they can have if only they stay in school. The Angel Scholarship Program is a great example of how God uses different tools for people who do not know Him to hear and experience God's love directly.

We currently have 20 adolescents enrolled in the program, with the desire to have 10 more students by the end of this summer. Many of these teens have been in the program for over a year, others are new students, and all of them have learned to see God's presence in their lives. This has been the result of regularly attending scholarship workshops, for parents and children, and also by attending San Pablo (St Paul) Lutheran Church in El Maclovio which guides them in Christian values.

The Angel Scholarship Program is grateful for all the support given by sponsors and donors in the United States that have had the desire to impact and bless these young lives! Thanks be to God!
