

What Donations Accomplish Big & Small

What \$1,850.00 is doing for a family in Mexico.

It builds a new, small home. It is a 12' x 12' house, with a locking door, a window and a nice roof. With this money, materials can be purchased for the cement slab, the lumber for the walls and roof, the window, the door, the door knob, the nails and the paint. The house can be built by a mission team from a church or group. There are times when a family or individual want to bless a family with a new home. Sometimes the church or group cannot go to Mexico but they still want the house to be built. In this case, we look for volunteers, both from the USA and Mexico that want to help build a home.

What .97¢ is doing.

Every time I go out with my family for dinner I spend a lot of money. Buying food for my table in the San Diego area is the same. In our Breakfast Programs south of the border in Baja California and Sonora, we can feed a child a meal for 97ϕ . It is not a fancy breakfast, but it is nutritious and delicious. Sometimes the ladies at the center treat the children with the local food specialties like tamales, burritos, tacos, etc.

Beside a nutritious meal, what else happens here? A little boy may come for the first time; then he brings his brothers and sisters. Most children walk themselves to the center to have breakfast. Some of them invite friends they find on their way. Others may be brought by their mothers. While the children are having breakfast or playing with the other children, the

mothers are watching what is going on. Soon they join in to eat and help clean up. Next time they may help by serving or preparing food. A few weeks later, the husbands, out of curiosity, will show up. Sometimes the family dog even stops by, hoping for a bite of something good. Soon after the whole family is attending church services! The Breakfast Program helps provide food for those in need, but it creates the opportunity for the whole family to hear God's Word.

How about \$140.00 or \$160.00?

These amounts are what the students receive as a scholarship, \$140.00 for Elementary and Jr. High School or \$160.00 for High School. The students receive the funds twice a year at the beginning of each semester. The scholarship provides just enough for uniforms, school & athletic shoes, books and school fees. In Mexico. public education is not free: Elementary and Jr. High school students need to pay an entry fee every year and High School students pay an entry fee every semester. For families that make about \$2500.00 a year, it becomes difficult to cover all the expenses for the family for food, water, electricity, etc. and sending children to school becomes difficult.

We also receive and distribute school supplies and backpacks to help children stay in school. These supplies are not just for scholarship recipients but also for students in the churches and missions, breakfast centers and neighborhoods in Tijuana, Tecate, Mexicali and San Luis Rio Colorado. As much as we want the children to come to church and know Jesus, we also want them to stay in school and get a good education.
